THE SCHOOL

HISTORY

The Law School of Golden Gate College was established in 1901 by the Young Men's Christian Association of San Francisco. It was thought advisable from the start to hold classes in the evening so that students could profit by the contacts of an active business life and the opportunity they afford for practical experience and growth. A high grade of instruction at a low tuition cost has been made possible through the assistance and cooperation of the Association and the faculty.

The Honorable James A. Ballentine served as the first Dean of the School of Law from 1901 to 1906. During the past thirteen years Attorney J. E. White has been Dean of the School.

The earthquake and fire of 1906 destroyed the building housing the college. The school went on, however, and classes met wherever room could be found. At this critical time the General Secretary, Henry J. McCoy, raised a half million dollars in the East to build Central Branch, the school and club home of Golden Gate College.

Here the school has developed a practical and comprehensive evening course of legal training.

PURPOSE

The Golden Gate College of Law was established and has been maintained to provide an opportunity for ambitious men and women to acquire a knowledge of the law for business and professional use. Golden Gate College is a non-profit organization. Ways are provided to make it possible for anyone who is qualified for the study of law to finance his training.

LOCATION

Golden Gate College is located on the third and fourth floors of the Central Y. M. C. A. at 220 Golden Gate Avenue, San Francisco.

This central location in the downtown district of the city makes it readily accessible to anyone residing

or employed in the Bay Region.

In the Civic Center, three blocks from the College, are conveniently located the City Law Library, the State Supreme Court, and the Municipal and Superior Courts, which afford unusual opportunities for advanced research and moot court practice.

LAW LIBRARY

The school maintains a complete library on California Law with the California Reports, California Jurisprudence, Kerr's Digest, California Digest, Shepard's California Citator, Bancroft's California Pleadings and Code Practice, and the California Codes and General Laws. In addition, the United States Supreme Court Cases, Corpus Juris, American State Reports and standard text books and treatises on law, make up the small but effective student library.

The extensive facilities of the law library located in the city hall, are available to students for use in

research and brief making.

FACULTY

The faculty is composed of seventeen attorneys, actively engaged in the practice of law. Opportunity is thus afforded for contact with successful lawyers who usually teach courses in which their practice is specialized. These men are graduates of the leading law schools of the country.

TEACHING METHOD

The case book method is used at Golden Gate College. We follow Stanford, the University of California and Harvard in the case books used, and the subjects covered. The cases are required to be briefed and presented for discussion and criticism during class sessions. California cases, recent decisions, and code study are prescribed to parallel case book assignments.

CLASSES

Regular classes in professional law are held on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings between the hours of seven and nine. Classes in the Pre-Legal courses meet on Tuesday and Friday evenings, from seven to nine.

Certain classes meet three hours an evening and others meet on a fourth night.

LENGTH OF COURSE

The course in law leading to the LL. B. degree covers a period of approximately four years of professional study. Classes begin in August and in January. Beginning in January, 1933, the professional course will be extended to four and one-half years. The college year is divided into two semesters and a summer session. Classes are held forty-five weeks each year.

There are three vacation periods yearly of two weeks each, in May, August and December.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

Men and women are admitted as regular students and candidates for the degree of Bachelor of Laws who have satisfactorily completed one year of college or university work.

High School graduates who satisfactorily complete the Pre-Legal course may also be admitted as regular students. Pre-Legal students may take one of the first year law courses in addition to the Pre-Legal. The course is described on page 22.

A limited number of special students may be enrolled. These students are not eligible for the degree of Bachelor of Laws, but are awarded law certificates on completion of the course.

REGISTRATION

Application for admission to the School of Law should be made to the Registrar at least a week before the opening of the term.

It is recommended that registration be made earlier if possible and that the books for the first year be secured well in advance. Printed instructions are available and students may immediately prepare for the first year courses.

EXAMINATIONS AND ATTENDANCE

One or two mid-term examinations and a final examination are held in each semester course.

Attendance is required in at least seventy-five per cent (75%) of the class periods in each course.

A conditional grade must be removed within one year of the time it is received.

FACULTY RESERVATION

The faculty reserves the right to refuse a diploma to any student who is found at any time to have such a character or want of capacity that the faculty cannot honestly recommend him to the State Board of Bar Examiners.

If the total annual fees of \$140.00 are paid in full within thirty days of registration, an 8% discount is allowed, making the total for tuition \$128.80.

A budget plan for the payment of tuition is provided for students who find it inconvenient to take advantage of the cash discount.

BOOK STORE

Law books may be purchased through the College Book store at list prices.

For the convenience of students, both new and used books may be purchased on a budget plan of five monthly payments.

Law dictionaries, codes and sets of law books may be purchased on the same plan. The College cooperates with the students in the re-sale of their used books and purchases needed used books direct from the students.

THE CLUB ROOM

A social club room is provided by the College where students may gather informally between classes.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Social activities are arranged for by the Student Council in co-operation with the Administration. Opportunity is thus afforded to become socially acquainted with the other men in the Law School and with the students of the Traffic, Accounting and Insurance schools.

GOLDEN GATE BAR ASSOCIATION

Students in the School of Law automatically become members of the Golden Gate Bar Association. A series of talks is given during the year by prominent members of the Bar and Professors from the nearby Universities.

KAPPA TAU EPSILON ALPHA CHAPTER

Membership in Kappa Tau Epsilon, a professional, honorary, legal fraternity, is open to law students registered for their second, third or fourth years. New members are elected on a basis of scholarship and ability.

DEBATING

Golden Gate College is a member of the Bay Counties Debating League, and participates in a number of public debates each year. Special training is provided for students interested in debating and public speaking.

LAW REVIEW COURSE

A review course is offered by the faculty at the conclusion of the legal curriculum. The course is twelve weeks in length and consists of eighty-four hours of lectures and forty-two hours of examinations. Fundamental legal principles are studied and interrelated by the lectures and discussions. Practice in analyzing complicated legal problems and in writing logical answers is afforded by the series of forty-one examinations. The answers are individually corrected and model answers are furnished.

Law Faculty

PRE-LEGAL COURSE

Purpose

The Pre-Legal Curriculum offers to high school graduates who have not had an opportunity for a University education, an adequate background in history, economics, political science, and English for the professional study of law.

Organization

Students enrolling in Pre-Legal in August will be ready to begin the study of professional law in June. Students enrolling in January, by carrying a heavier schedule, may enter professional courses the following August. Classes meet from seven to nine on Tuesday and Friday evenings. Approximately eight to ten hours of outside reading will be required each week in addition to the class work. By special permission, Pre-Legal students may take a first year law subject in addition to the Pre-Legal curriculum.
