FACULTY/STUDENT EVALUATION COMMITTEE

CONSPIRACY CORNER

****NOTICE****

On Wednesday, October 22, on KNBR (680AM), from 8:00 - 11:00 PM, Sherman Skolnick will appear on a talk show. Skolnick is one of the country's leading experts on conspiracy theory. Anyone interested in hearing that part of the news that is censored by the major news media should listen.

The saga of the SLA has to be the most bizarre news story in the history of The United States. Was the SLA a dedicated group of revolutionaries trying to create a movement to bring "death to the fascist insect that prays on the life of the people."? Or were they a band of governmental agent provocateurs carrying out a plan to discredit legitimate radical leftist groups, isolate prisoners from genuine reform programs, and instill a fear in the population that will facilitate in the implementation of marshall law in the USA? This column will examine Donald DeFreeze; alias General Field Marshall Cinque and his role in the SLA.

During his 31 years DeFreeze had been arrested 13 times on various charges, most of them involving guns, yet despite his record he only spent 65 days in jail up until his last arrest in 1969.

Louis Tackwood, a former police agent assigned to the LAPD criminal conspiracy squad, has identified DeFreeze as a fellow undercover police agent from 1967 - 1969.

He set up his "partners" in crime various times during that two year period. In 1967 DeFreeze led police to Ronald Coleman's apartment where they confiscated a cache of 200 guns. Two years later on November 11, 1969 he was arrested for shooting it out with a bank guard with one of those same 200 guns that the police had confiscated from Coleman's apartment. It was after this, his last arrest, that DeFreeze was sent to Vacaville Medical Facility where studies of behavior modification were being conducted.

Colton Westbrook, who had been trained in the psychological warfare unit of the CIA was put in charge of the Black Cultural Association (BCA) at Vacaville, of which DeFreeze was a member. Russell Little, and other future SLA members also participated. The cover story for the BCA was a prison reform group dedicated to the development of black pride. As it turned out

In the year 2018 corporations have taken over the world, and have eliminated such familiar problems as war, poverty, and the ERA (women exist largely as objects of reward bestowed by management upon deserving males.) In this new world, the principal form of leisure activity is watching Multi-vision, a form of television with four screens instead of one. The most popular program is Rollerball, a violent sport provided by corporate management as a substitute for the wars that no longer exist. Only midway through the film is the real reason made clear - to show the futility of the individual effort.

As a sport, Rollerball is a combination of roller derby, football, and hockey. Each game begins with the ball being blasted out of a cannon. Dropping down the steeply banked track like a roulette ball seeking its slot, the ball is grabbed by a player with the intent to score by jamming it into a magnetic goal. Each team has eight skaters and three bikers. The game is rough and careers are understandably short.

It is in this setting that James Caan, as the game's greatest player, must survive. Not only has he lasted longer than anyone else, he has committed the ultimate sin against corporate control - he has become through his individual achievement a worldwide cult hero, and because of that individual adulation, corporate management has decided that he must be eliminated. This conflict is set against the back-ground of the World Championships. The quarter-finals serves only to demonstrate the basics and convey the rules. Caan has refused to retire, so in the semi-finals all penalties are eliminated - changing the object from winning to surviving. Caan still refuses to retire, so in the finals it is no time limit, no substitutions. Play will be over when only one player remains.

Caan is adequate in a role whose main demands are physical. John Houseman, as a corporate director, seems to be more patronizing than necessary but that is

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this group which later became the SLA turned back prison reform movements 100 years and ultimately issued death warrants for such prominent black leaders as Dr. Marcus Foster Huey Newton, and Bobby Seale.

In December, 1972, after his indoctrination at Vacaville DeFreeze was sent to Soledad. He escaped in March, 1973 by walking out. Normally when a con escapes one of the first places police look is at the homes of friends. Despite his contact with Little, the Harris's, and others through the BCA, apparently no one thought to look for him at these homes.

While the real DeFreeze was still in Soledad Bernard Keaton, his double, passed himself off as DeFreeze to a family in Buffalo DeFreeze had lived with 15 years ago. The FBI claims that this wasn't illegal and that they weren't at all interested in Keaton. He has since disappeared.

All these incidents suggest that DeFreeze was not really acting on his own, but that rather he was acting under the influence of various governmental agencies.

Certainly the aim of these agencies has been fulfilled by the actions of the LA. There is a national fear of terrorist organizations. Prison reform has taken a giant step backwards. SWAT teams are now located in every major city. The cremation of the SLA was looked upon by most people as a justifiable use of force. People look at that incident and say, "Well the police probably did act illegally, but in this case it was okay." That type of thinking is most dangerous, and attitudes like it can lead to nothing else but a total police state.

probably how corporate types react to those below them in a hierarchy. Ralph Richardson appears briefly as a librarian.

Aside from Rollerball, life as provided by corporate management is pretty dull. For reasons not exactly explained, Caan's wife was replaced. While he is upset about it, one wonders why since the women in his life (Maud Adams, Pamela Hensley, and Barbara Trentham) seem to be mass produced from the same design and are interchangeable.

For director Jewison, ROLLERBALL is a major undertaking. His major problem was to invent the sport that gives the film its title (the story on which it is based gave few details), and make it seem believable. His success is indicated by the fact that reportedly a professional league is being organized in Europe. It is anyone's guess how Charles O. Finley would run a franchise (color the ball orange?). ABC's response would be more predictable (Monday nights with Frank, Alex, and The Mouth). Despite its flaws (the background music was chosen to invite comparison with 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY, but it only makes the film look more pretentious than it really is). ROLLERBALL is a warning of what life may be like when the world is in the hands of the corporate powers. One is tempted to say, "What's the difference?"
