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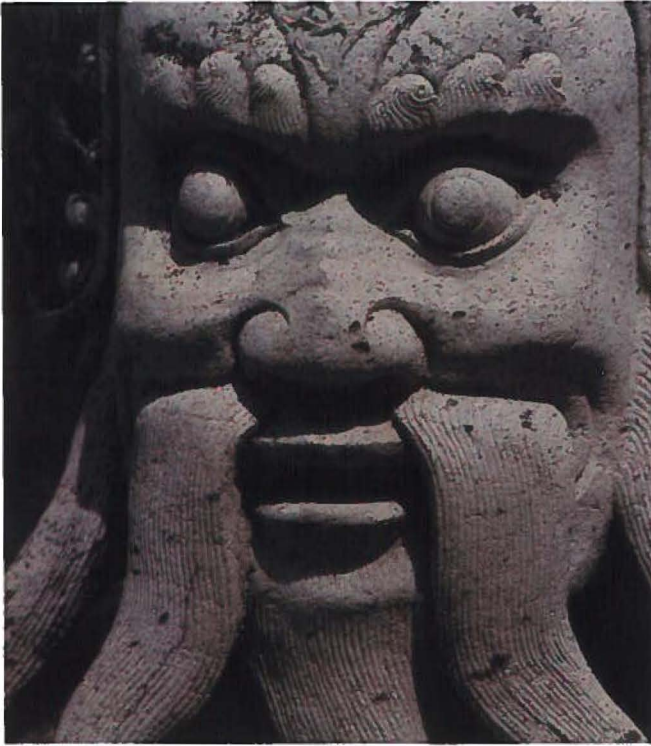

Golden Gate University will offer a six-week summer program at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand in 1992. The program will provide law students with an opportunity to study, through coursework, field trips, and clinical visitations, international and comparative law subjects, with an emphasis on the legal systems of Thailand and other ASEAN and Pacific Rim countries.



LOCATION

Sitting astride two other ancient Asian cultures, the Indian and the Chinese, Thailand has developed and maintained her own cultural heritage. Thailand is a regional hub which hosts the Social and Economic Commission of the United Nations for Asia and the Pacific and houses the regional headquarters of many of its specialized agencies. The city of Bangkok offers an abundance of educational and cultural activities, including museums, theater, and historical landmarks.

CURRICULUM

The innovative curriculum combines traditional coursework, classes with a unique field study component, and an optional one-week visitation to key international agencies and universities in Indonesia, Malaysia, and Singapore. Students can register for two or three courses, to receive a total of four to six units of academic credit.

C O U R S E S

CURRENT INTERNATIONAL LEGAL PROBLEMS affecting the Pacific Rim. Examines both problems originating in the Pacific Region and those generating consequences from afar but affecting the Asian Pacific. It covers problems of public international law, international trade law, and conflict of laws as well as alternative dispute resolution. Intra-ASEAN and Inter-Regional Relations will also be examined. Professor Sucharitkul.

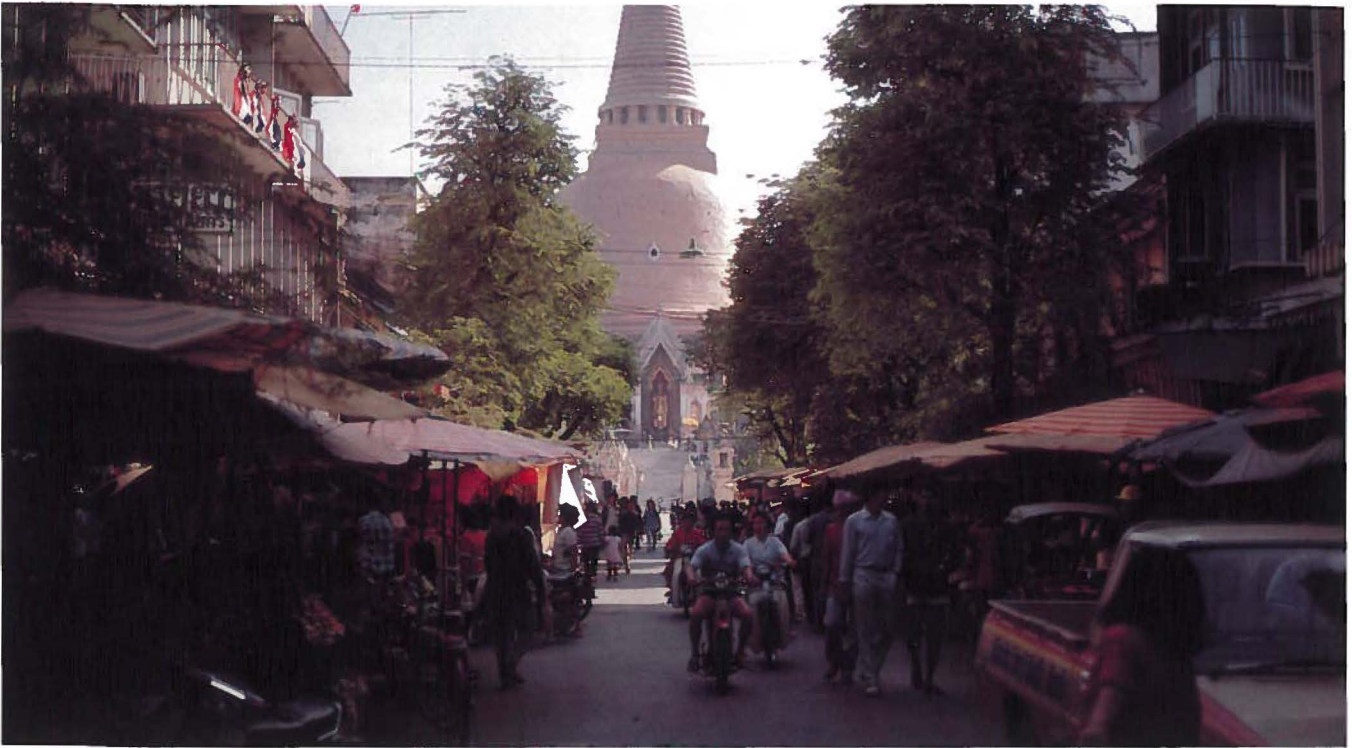
INTERNATIONAL TRADE LAW or International Economic Law. Relates to the regulations of international trade, investments, international finance, transportation, and banking institutions, facilitating freer flow of international trade at national and international levels. Professor Surakiat Sathirathai.

REGIONAL ORGANIZATIONS. Examines the roles and responsibilities of regional international organizations. Bangkok plays host to the United Nations Commission for Asia and the Pacific as well as organs of the United Nations, such as UNDP, UNHCR, UNICEF, FAO, WHO, WMO, ILO, ICAO, and WFP. Non-governmental organizations such as ICRC (Red Cross), OXFAM, and Medecins sans Frontieres are also present. Students will have opportunities to visit regional organizations. Professor Muntrabhorn.

INTERNATIONAL CONTRACTS. Transnational business transactions are concluded daily within the ASEAN region. This course will acquaint students with practical aspects of drafting international contracts, including crucial clauses allowing contractors freedom to select in advance the applicable law, the preferred method of dispute resolution, and the competent forum in the event of a dispute. Professors Chandler and Juttasombat.

LAW-POLITICS-ECONOMICS AND DEVELOPMENT. Designed as an introduction to Thai legal system and culture. Its objective is to acquaint students with basic knowledge of the elements that compose the Thai legal system and the components of its cultural heritage. Students will meet with Thai students. Organized visits will be made to the Law Courts, Attorney General's Office, Ministry of Justice, and to ancient capitals of Thailand, Sukhothai, and Ayudhya. Dean Kovilaikool.

COMPARATIVE INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY LAW. Examines legal protection of intellectual property rights in the law and practice of ASEAN countries as compared to the law in force in the United States and in Europe. National legislation will be studied in the light of international obligations of State parties to relevant conventions. Professor Blatt.



F A C U L T Y

SOMPONG SUCHARITKUL, Distinguished Professor of International and Comparative Law of Golden Gate University and Director of the Summer Program, received his B.A. Hons. (Jurisprudence), B.C.L., M.A., D.Phil., and D.C.L. from Oxford, Docteur en Droit, D.E.S.D.I.Pub. from Paris, and LL.M. from Harvard. He is a Barrister-at-Law of the Middle Temple, United Kingdom, and holds a Diploma of the Hague Academy of International Law. Professor Sucharitkul served 10 years as Member and Special Rapporteur of the International Law Commission. He is a Member of the Institute of International Law, a Corresponding Collaborator of UNIDROIT, and a Member of the Panels of Arbitrators and of Conciliators of ICSID (World Bank).

JEFFREY J. BLATT, Attorney at Law, received a J.D. from Lewis and Clark College and has published articles on copyright law. He is registered to practice before the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office. He teaches Comparative Intellectual Property Law.

ALBERT CHANDLER, Attorney at Law, is an LL.B. from Harvard Law School and a practicing attorney in Bangkok. He teaches the practical aspects of International Contracts, or commercial contracts involving a foreign element.

NIBANDH JUTTASOMBAT, Associate Professor of the Faculty of Law of Chulalongkorn University, teaches International Contracts jointly with Professor Chandler, covering the choice of law, choice of method of dispute resolution, and choice of forum.

PRASIT KOVILAIKOOL, Dean of the Faculty of Law of Chulalongkorn University, received an LL.M. from Columbia Law School. He conducts team teaching on Law-Politics-Economics and Development, and Introduction to Thai Legal System and Culture.

VITIT MUNTRABHORN, Associate Professor of the Faculty of Law of Chulalongkorn University, obtained his B.A.Hons. (Jurisprudence), B.C.L., and M.A. from Oxford University and LL.M. from Brussels. A Barrister-at-Law, Professor Muntrabhorn is a specialist in ASEAN laws. He teaches Regional Organizations as well as International Human Rights.

SURAKIAT SATHIRATHAI, Associate Dean for Foreign Relations of the Faculty of Law of Chulalongkorn University, is a graduate of Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy and received his LL.M. and S.J.D. from Harvard Law School. As Coordinator for the Summer Program, Professor Sathirathai is a renowned specialist in International Trade Law and an authority on international investments in developing countries.

ACCOMMODATIONS AND TRANSPORTATION

Students participating in the summer program are responsible for their own transportation to and from Thailand and for accommodations during their stay. The School of Law will assist students in locating suitable, affordable housing at modest rates. Tuition includes the week of clinical visitations, but transportation and accommodation expenses for these visitations are the responsibility of the student.



A P P L I C A T I O N

This program is approved by the American Bar Association. Student applicants must have completed at least one academic year of full-time or two years of part-time law study.

APPLICANTS SHOULD SUBMIT:

1. Transcript or evidence of graduation from an ABA-accredited law school
 2. Statement of good standing from the law school
- For students not enrolled at Golden Gate University, transfer of credits to another law school will be the responsibility of the student.

Unless otherwise indicated, all courses of instruction are offered on a graded semester unit basis. Instruction for all courses will be given in English.

FEES AND REGISTRATION

A registration fee of \$200, payable to Golden Gate University School of Law, is due with the application, of which \$25 is non-refundable. This money will be applied to the tuition fee for those attending the program.

Tuition is \$1,600 for up to six units; \$1,200 for up to four units. The fee includes the use of facilities at the law library of Chulalongkorn University and

course materials supplied by professors. It does not include air fare, traveling expenses, accommodations, or books.

THE APPLICATION AND REGISTRATION FEE ARE DUE BY MARCH 1, 1992. The completed application, including final tuition payments, is due by April 1, 1992. Late applications will be accepted if openings remain. Enrollment is limited.

A late fee of \$20 will be charged for tuition payments received and accepted after April 1, 1992. A late fee of \$50 will be charged for tuition payments received and accepted after May 1, 1992.
