San Francisco Supervisor Candidates Scheduled to Debate on November 2

SAN FRANCISCO—The top 10 ranking candidates for San Francisco Supervisor will participate in a debate scheduled from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m., Wednesday, Nov. 2, in the second-floor auditoriums at Golden Gate University, 536 Mission St. The debate is free and open to the public.

City Attorney Louise Renne will moderate and five panelists representing various interest groups will pose questions for the candidates during the two, one-hour sessions. Each session will spotlight five candidates.

Invited to debate are the top 10 ranking candidates according to a poll by the *San Francisco Examiner*: incumbents Carole Migden, Kevin Shelley, Annemarie Conroy and Susan Leal; Mabel Teng, a Community College Board member; Arthur Jackson, president of the Health Commission; Tom Ammiano, president of the Board of Education; Sylvia Courtney, a labor attorney; Bruce Quan, an attorney; and Alicia Wang.

The five candidates receiving the most votes in the Nov. 8 election will win a four-year term on the Board of Supervisors.

The debate is being sponsored by the Commonwealth Club, the Bar Association of San Francisco, the Golden Gate University School of Law and its Student Bar Association, the Chamber of Commerce and the Barrister's Club of San Francisco.

"The debate is an excellent opportunity to hear where the candidates stand on the issues. We're looking forward to a lively and informative exchange of ideas," said Stacey Camillo, Student Bar Association president and member of the debate committee.
