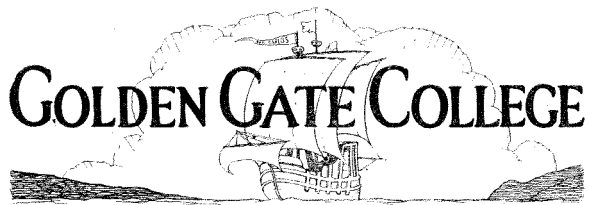

GENERAL

Location	Golden Gate College is located in the heart of San Francisco's civic activities. The center of all the political life of the city is in the Civic Center but two blocks away. Thus there is about Golden Gate College an atmosphere of the law and its relation to the problems of civic life.
Library	Golden Gate College maintains a good working library composed of reports and up-to-date reference matter. There is unusual opportunity for legal research work in the law library of the City Hall, which is one of the finest in California. The facilities of the Public Library, also just two blocks away, are at the disposal of our students.
Purpose	The purpose of Golden Gate College is the development of character through the enrichment of personality. It seeks to develop marketable vocational abilities. In the School of Law it is practical legal training fortified by the best ideals of the profession.
Experience	For twenty-two years Golden Gate College has been training young men for the legal profession. Since the institution of the State bar examination but two men have failed to meet its requirements. This is an enviable record and assures you of training which will adequately fit you for the profession of law.
Faculty	The success of Golden Gate College has been due entirely to the quality of instruction given. The faculty is composed of successful practicing attorneys who are men of high Christian character, deeply interested in the training of young men for the profession.
Method of Instruction	The case method of instruction is used. It is recognized as the most efficient method of teaching law. All important cases are required to be briefed, supplemented by reading assignments and special reports. The discussion method offers opportunity for legal thinking and expression.
Degree	Golden Gate College is legally authorized to confer the degree of Bachelor of Laws upon each student who successfully completes the required curriculum.

CURRICULUM

PRE-LEGAL

- Elementary Law A general survey of the main principles of the common law, with special reference to its influence to existing legal conceptions, preliminary discussions of codes, decisions and statutes—assigned readings and lectures.
Text: Blackstone's Commentaries. Jones Ed., Two Vols. MR. ELLIS
- International Law The origin, history and fundamental principles underlying international relations are the subjects treated in this course. The introduction to the study of law is given large consideration.
Text: Scott Cases on International Law. MR. WHITE
- History of Jurisprudence A course based upon history and assigned readings, showing the development of law through its different stages to the present time, its methods of growth, aims and objects. In it are traced the relation to history and government, with a comparison of Roman and European legal history with that of England and America.
Text: Maitland and Montague. A Short History of English Law. MR. PILLSBURY

FIRST YEAR LAW

- Contracts In this course the nature, interpretation, formation, performance and discharge of contracts is considered.
Text: Williston. Cases on Contracts. Two Vols. MR. KELSEY
- Crimes The courses of criminal law are studied in this course as introductory to consideration of specific crimes and their elements and of criminal law under the Penal Code of California.
Text: Mikell's Cases on Criminal Law. MR. SHEFFEY
- Personal Property A study of the elements of the law of personal property considering in detail the acquisition, holding and disposition of all types of personal property.
Text: American Case Book Series. Vol. I. MR. SHEFFEY
- Torts A course dealing with the elements of legal wrongs, independent of contracts and crimes, committed by a person upon the person or property of another.
Text: Bohlen's Cases on Torts, Two Vols. MR. GEARHART
- Agency This course deals with the nature, formation, performance and discharge of the relationship of agency and the legal incidents thereof.
Text: Reinhard. Cases on Agency. I Vol. MR. KELSEY

SECOND YEAR LAW

Equity	This course deals with the origin, historical development and essential nature of equity, jurisprudence and the theory and application of equitable remedies. <i>Text: Ames. Cases on Equity. I Vol.</i>	MR. KELSEY
Sales	The subject covers sales of personal property in its various branches, consisting of lectures and assigned cases. <i>Text: Woodward. Cases on Sales.</i>	MR. ALLAN
Partnership	Formation, operation, general relation, and dissolution of partnerships. <i>Text: Mechem. Elements, Civil Code of California and Assigned Cases.</i>	MR. ALLAN
Real Property	A thorough study of the law of Real Property based upon a case book, supplemented by occasional lectures showing the historical and economic background of the legal rules, as well as the factors influencing their development. <i>Text: American Case Book Series, Vol. II; Rights in Land, Vol. IV; Future Interest.</i>	MR. PILLSBURY

THIRD YEAR LAW

(Alternate with Fourth Year—Offered in 1923)

Corporations	Presents general law of corporations, both at common law and under leading statutes, in their corporate activities from organization to dissolution. <i>Text: Canfield and Wormser. Cases on Corporations. I Vol.</i>	MR. HADSELL
Pleading	A study of the principles and forms for the preparation of complaints and other pleadings of common law and under the California Code of Civil Procedure. A selected list of California cases and forms is studied.	MR. MACDONALD
Wills and Administration	The making of wills, probate of estates and inheritance in general, are the basis for this course of lectures and selected cases. <i>Text: Costigan, Cases on Wills. I Vol.</i>	MR. WHITE
Constitutional Law	The study of the organic law of the nation and the state are covered by lectures and assigned readings.	MR. WHITE

Negotiable Instruments	<p>All the questions relating to commercial paper are covered by lectures and selected cases.
